Mid Year Summary June 2020

DEAR FRIENDS,

I thank God for the privilege of being in our Ugandan farming village with these precious little angels as they pour their hearts out in prayer. If there is such a thing as a "pipeline to heaven", there is no shadow of a doubt in my mind that our babies have it.

These children do not pray for superfluous things. They literally ask their Abba for food, for clean water, for help at school, for their sick guardian to be healed, for crops to grow, for rain to come or for floods to stop. They are "give us this day" prayers. And now, with their schools closed, the transportation of crops halted, social isolation and the threat of death by coronavirus causing panic and fear, our children in Uganda are praying for their very lives.

At this writing in late April only 78 cases of the virus have been reported in Uganda. Thankfully the President was very proactive with his strict country and border lockdown. But just yesterday news of infected truckers getting past the borders and into the Kabale mountains where we live was in the news. I do not know what will have happened between now and when you receive this newsletter in June. We are praying God protect them and their guardians, most of whom are grandparents.

If this disease takes off it will be devastating because Uganda's Healthcare is also sick. The entire country has only 55 functional beds in the 12 ICU's being operated. Of the 12 operational ICU's only 3 are in public hospitals. An additional 20 of the 55 beds have no ventilatory capacity. That is 1.3 ICU beds per million population. And if those statistics are not frightening enough, only 7.6% of ICU staff nurses have some sort of formal ICU training (Daily Monitor; March 18, 2020).

So yes...Please pray for our children and their guardians in Uganda. Please pray for our Executive Director, Ivan and his family. Please pray for our MCM-UG Board, our supporting church, our counselors and teachers and pastors and friends. Pray for Kabale. Please, as you never have before, please pray as God leads you. God is faithful and good. He heals and He is powerful. He has overcome death and nothing can separate us from His Love. He suffers with us and never will leave us nor forsake us. We are expecting miracles and trusting Him no matter what. After all....Love wins.

In this June 2020 Newsletter we have chosen to focus on the positive and look forward in hope. Thank you for all of your wonderful support and prayers as always!

UPDATES FROM IVAN IN UGANDA: JUNE 2020

Greetings in the Name of our Savior Jesus! I pray that the Lord has kept each one of you safe and healthy during this Coronavirus outbreak period. We thank God for the protection He has put upon every single child and their family here during this hard time. All the children in MCM are healthy and well at this writing. Truly God has not ceased doing good amongst us! I would like to testify about His goodness to our children this past six months.

As I reported in the December 2019 newsletter, five of our children graduated from different institutes of learning last year. Some of them decided to return and give back to MCM and their community!



Aaron graduated from vocational school with a certificate in Automative Systems in 2018. After a year of working in the city, he decided to return home and find wavs of being helpful to MCM and his community. Aaron wanted to help other children find a way of making it like he did. In November MCM asked Aaron if he

would work with the dairy project full time.

This young man consistently goes above and beyond what his role requires because of his desire to be an example to the other children in MCM. Often times, one will find him helping the children during Bible study or arranging seats and cleaning them. Aaron also visits some boarding children to check on their welfare. We feel like Aaron is a gift from God to this ministry. He is incredibly humble and we are glad to have him on our team!

Guma is another former MCM student who finished vocational school then requested to help out with the

piggery. He is in charge of the Pig income generation project and has surpassed our expectation in working with the project. He is incredibly hardworking and a true blessing to this organization. We believe his efforts will lead to more income and bless other needy children. We are grateful for Guma and the example he sets for other MCM children.



Though Ishmael has not yet completed Rwampara Farming Institute, the knowledge he has attained at school thus far is being applied now, and we have been so blessed. MCM is actually averting some of the earlier mistakes we made in farming and animal rearing because of his educated input. One example is the environment the cows were residing in. Though it wasn't bad, his extra ideas have been

healthier for the cows and reduced the amount of flies around them. Ishmael continues to be humble and hardworking as well.

More MCM graduates also give their time and talents to help. **Rhodo**, now a great nursery teacher and **Annabel**, a fantastic secondary school teacher, return to our village every time we have the Counseling Sessions. These two fine young women keep the two days running smoothly - organizing kids for counseling sessions, their folders for the counselors

and everyone for lunches and other classes. We could not manage those two days without their administrative gifts.

Obed, who graduated a couple of years ago from university with a degree in Social Work and Social Administration, got a good job as a Social Worker with an organization that helps with street children in Kabale. He is doing great

work there. MCM also occasionally requests him to come over and help us with his knowledge when we have social work issues and he has done tremendous work for this ministry too. Obed is now a married man and is blessed with one child!

God has used this organization to move these kids from scratch to glory for the benefit of His Kingdom and other children. Stories such as these make me light up with joy and anticipation of a brighter future for this community. Our hope and prayer is that other MCM children will notice these young men and women and be

We are SUPER excited to have begun this in early April just when our students were sent home from school for COVID reasons. It has been a beacon of hope for the future at a time when hope is scarce.

CLAIRE KYASIMIIRE

Claire's father left her mother when she was pregnant with Claire. He has not been heard from since and the family does not even know if he is alive. Claire's mother is now bringing her children up as a single parent and it has been a challenge since her income only comes from manual farm labor. Claire is in Primary Six (12 years old) and wants to become a nurse.



RUKIA NATUKUNDA

Rukia (11) lost her father in 2017 after an illness. Her mother's history of mental problems makes her unfit to look after children. Rukia's grandparents took her in after the passing of her Dad. She is in Primary Three and dreams of being a teacher one day. Her grandparents are peasant farmers and they do not earn enough to care for Rukia.



MARK KUKIRIZA

Mark (16) lost both his parents a few years ago. When they died they left him in the care of his older step-sister who has two babies of her own and cannot afford Mark's schooling. Mark is a quiet, hard working boy who loves the Lord and wants to be a Doctor someday. He is in Senior Four.

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WILLIAM MUKAMAYEBARE

William (6) never knew his father and rarely sees his mother who left him when he was eight months old with his grandmother who also cares for two other young children. William's grandma is losing her strength to do farming to raise the children. William is a sweet, shy boy who enjoys math loves angel stories in the Bible He is in Primary One and wants to be a "moto car driver" someday.

WORDS FROM OUR SPONSOR: JOYCE GIBSON

Introduction by Michele

Joyce is a Hero of mine, a dear friend from church. She has sponsored Elijah Abaho since 2018 and has loved him well. This year when Elijah passed his University entrance exams Joyce even sent him resources for a computer and a computer class before University begins in the Fall.

However, with Joyce, my Hero, that was not enough. One day on her couch while visiting she asked me, "Michele, what exactly are you planning on doing to bless the children in your village who are NOT on your MCM program?" "Ummm" I answered, "I guess we should pray." I was assuming we would pray in the future but when I looked up, Joyce was already praying so I joined her. After several minutes she shared her thoughts. I asked her to write them down for you below...



"I loved Jesus and wanted to please Him everyday of my life. Decades ago when I was 7 years old I had a dream. Actually it was more than a dream. It was a quiet, certainty God was telling me something He wanted me to do. As I grew, I had a sure sense God wanted me to be a storyteller who would draw children to Jesus and His living book, the Bible.

I started teaching Sunday school at age 13 and did not slow down until after my 90th birthday. Once grown, I invested my life in writing Bible curriculum for children. Every lesson guided boys and girls to discover God in Bible stories and learn His lessons on what truly brings life to the full.

Now I am 91 years old and I am looking for more ways to tell stories. The fact has been proven over the years books shape lives. They give birth to hopes and dreams, instruction and life direction - even to pre-readers. When I asked Michele what she was doing to bless the children who were NOT on the MCM program we prayed together and I believe God quietly assured me that others needed to continue being the storytellers, drawing not just MCM children but ALL the village children to hear in their oral tradition, and to read books. My dream today is to see a library for our Mountain Children in Uganda. Quality books that make reading appealing to young children to spark their desire to learn and grow. Books open children's eyes and broaden their world to discover how they can fulfill their dreams and be people God uses for His glory."

Then, without hesitation, Joyce gave the first donation to start our library construction fund.

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
