DEAR FRIENDS,

During my January 2019 visit to Uganda Ivan and I did several child home visits for a variety of reasons. Whether we were visiting a sick baby, ensuring that construction work had commenced for a new goat pen, collecting missing report cards, setting up solar lighting, or checking on the safety of our child's living situation we were welcomed most enthusiastically. These are charming characteristics of Ugandan culture - a high value of community, the honor they place on having guests and the warm hospitality each guest is given.

"You are welcome!" they exclaim with delight racing to you before you even reach the door as if they have been searching the horizon for you. If they have been prepared for your visit their mud homes are swept clean and the children are scrubbed too, wearing their Sunday clothes. Prepared or not, you are invited in and you are ushered to one of the few chairs they own. They sit on mats on their dirt floors smiling up expectantly at you. Even the poorest among them offers you a banana or a drink of the local Bushera made with sorghum grains. Over and over they thank you for the honor of visiting their home as if you are some kind of royalty who has graced them with your presence.

To me, an American from Chicagoland suburbs, this stands in stark contrast to our culture. Only the best of friends feels comfortable "dropping by" unexpectedly. If you are busy or have an appointment, company is expected to know you cannot visit as your schedule takes precedent. Although most Americans will offer their guests food or water they assume their unexpected guests will leave before meal time. Most certainly they would not think of spending the night. But in Uganda unexpected guests can drop by and expect to be hosted for weeks on end. The hosts would be considered rude to ask for their guest's future plans or exit date.

We at MCM want to imitate that Ugandan cultural posture which is so welcoming and focused on our guests. We have completed God's Refuge Guest House. We know the best way to get to really know your sponsored child or MCM is to experience it for yourself. So start planning now...you are welcome!

A special "Thank You!" to all who have blessed us with the resources to finish this Refuge. We currently have 4 children living there who come from abusive homes. We Thank God for being able to provide for the unsafe children in our community because of your generosity.

UPDATES FROM IVAN IN UGANDA: JUNE 2019

Sending warm greetings from Kabale Uganda. I want to take this opportunity to thank God who keeps doing good to His children here through our great sponsors, donors, prayer partners and all who support us in so many ways! I would like to highlight a changed life that has really made our hearts very happy this first half of 2019.

Ishmael Turyagyenda

In February of this year, we had 6 high school teens join higher institutes of learning. All of them say they are enjoying those changes in their lives very much. My focus today is on one teenager called Ishmael who chose to pursue a field in agriculture and animal husbandry.



MCM began helping Ishmael when he was fourteen years old. He was one of the first children on our program sponsored by the Green family in 2013. Being a double orphan (meaning both his mother and his father are deceased) Ishmael had been brought to stay with his Auntie Anne at a young age. However, he wasn't the only child staying with this wonderful single lady. There were another five children under her care all of whom belonged either to her deceased brothers and sisters or were children of relatives who were struggling 'more' than Auntie Anne. With no one to help her raise all these children, some started having behavioral issues and Ishmael was heading that way.

MCM noticed how this lady was truly overburdened so we added all of her children to our program. MCM sponsors put them in school and started providing a lot of their other needs as well. For some of these kids, it was too late to retrieve them and correct them so they ended up going rogue but we stuck in there with Ishmael. Along the way there were a few challenges and we almost gave up at some point but then he started showing signs, albeit slowly, of reforming.

Ishmael was able to finish his primary school level and passed well to continue to secondary school in 2015. Fast forward after four years of secondary school, Ishmael is now in college, 80 miles from home. He is studying to be an agricultural/animal specialist and he is so excited to be doing this course. He is such a transformed young man we are also surprised and delighted at the work the Lord has done in his life to get to where he is now. Ishmael's relatives are shocked when they hear how successful he has become compared to the boy he was 6 years prior!

When he came back home for his Easter break this April, Ishmael offered to do some farm work for the MCM organization. He exhibited to us some of the new farming methods he had learned at school. We are really impressed with Ishmael's work ethic and the knowledge he has attained. We believe God is going to use Ishmael to bring change to his family and community too with the skills he is learning at Agricultural and Animal Husbandry School.

Ironically on the American side, Ishmael's sponsors Jim and Shelly Green are also very involved in Agriculture and Animal Husbandry even though they work in the city of Detroit. In 2010 Jim began buying up land surrounding his factory, Milton Manufacturing, converted it to farmland and began urban farming raising fresh produce for local residents. Jim also began raising chickens, cows, goats, sheep and other farm animals in the unused areas of his factory so children in Detroit could participate in 4-H club.

Scholarship Needs

MCM has a total of 11 students in Senior 5 and Senior 6 this school year. These classes are called "A Level" in Uganda. Here in the USA we may recognize them as community college or other college prep school levels. What this means for MCM is the need to prepare for these young men and women to attend University if they demonstrate the necessary academic ability. University costs are a minimum of six times the cost of secondary school plus the necessary extras (internship costs, textbooks, computer classes etc). MCM is starting a scholarship fund for these upcoming needs and we would be so blessed if you would like to contribute to these bright young people's future success. We intend to create an application process and an Education/Career Committee to review these applicants as well. An essay and references will also be required. We want the students to recognize from the start the great blessing it is to be able to continue their education at the University level and their academic performance will be subject to review yearly to maintain their scholarship.

Research done by a group of development economists out of University of San Francisco (2008 - 2013) shows "extremely large, statistically significant impacts of child sponsorship in areas of education and leadership and job opportunities" * when that child was interviewed 25 years later as an adult and compared to their unsponsored siblings and peers. Furthermore "patient nurturing of self worth, self expectations, dreams and aspirations may be the critical part of helping children escape poverty." * To summarize, sponsors give children hope and that hope makes a sizable, measurable difference in eliminating poverty. SANDRA TUMWESIGYE

Sandra (14) lost both her parents and her older sister to AIDS by the time she was 9 years old. She passed her primary exams well and is now in Senior One with the goal of becoming an Accountant. Sandra lives with her uncle who is a peasant farmer and cannot afford her school fees.



SAM AGABA

Sam (14) and his two sisters were abandoned by their father when Sam was 9 yrs old. His mother was not able to provide for all the needs of her children so Sam lived with his uncle until last year when his uncle could no longer afford to pay his school fees. Sam scored a Division One grade on the Primary Leaving Exams. He is now in Senior One and aspires to be a Doctor.



OBED BYAMAMUKAMA

Obed (18) has a father who has become mentally ill and cannot provide for his family any longer. His mum is a peasant farmer and shoulders the burden of providing for the entire family of 10 children. Obed works hard helping his family but has an equally strong desire to attend school. He is now in Senior Five and wants to be an Engineer.



GLORIOUS NINSIIMA

Glorious (14) lost her father when she was three. Her mum is a peasant farmer who attempted to provide for Glorious and her sister but eventually had to send her sister to a relative for food and school fees. Glorious is in Senior One with the goal of becoming a Nurse.



ISAAC TUMWEBAZE

Isaac (13) lives with his single mum who digs the land of others for meager wages. There are three children in the family. Isaac is in Primary Seven and has the goal of becoming a Doctor. He is ranked first in his class and scores very high in math, science and social studies. Isaac will be taking his Primary Leaving Exams this November.



LEONIDAS KYOMUKAMA

Leonidas (8) has a disabled father who was hurt and became physically handicapped. Although he walks with crutches he still attempts to work manually digging fields. Leonidas's mum cannot earn enough farming to provide for the family. Leonidas is in Primary Three and wants to be a teacher when she grows up.
