

UPDATES FROM IVAN IN UGANDA: JUNE 2023

Greetings from Uganda!

We thank God who has kept you and your loved ones well. We have a lot we are grateful for as MCM Uganda and we want to start by sharing the difference boarding at school is now making in 148 of 196 of our sponsored children. Our reasons are many to make this choice to board MCM students.



ACADEMICS:

If a child shows extraordinary scholastic potential, we want to support this gifted child with a move to a more academically stimulating, competitive school. This always makes them smarter because they find other students and teachers who can challenge their intellect.

After COVID we noticed many students made disappointing declines in class. We attributed this to the two years they were out of school combined with every

child skipping forward a year on their return. The skipped class content would never be recuperated in rural schools because they did not teach the lost year. However, the urban schools were helping their learners go back and cover this content very fast. They understood if they did not, students would fail and so would their institutions. High final exam marks result in higher admission numbers the following year.

HOME BASED SITUATION/ABUSE:

Many of our teenage girls (and occasionally boys) are culturally required to become like servants of the household. They do the cooking, fetch water, look for firewood, babysit siblings, wash their uniforms and many more chores await them after returning from school until late into the evening. When MCM learns of this, the child is removed from the situation and placed in boarding school so she may have ample time to focus on her studies. MCM does not support a culture which allows guardians to use children as laborers. Less common, but sadly does occur, is physical or emotional abuse of children. MCM has seen fathers released from prison, drunkards, guardians who resent the very children they have taken in, and mentally ill caregivers resort to abusing children. In this case they are obviously much safer boarding away from the abusive family member.

BOARDING SCHOOLS ARE AN UPGRADE:

- The best teachers tend to shun rural schools so competition is greater for urban boarding school jobs.
 This allows them to hire the best teachers.
- Urban teachers are well paid and provided housing close to the school. With stiff competition they are motivated to get the best out of their students.



- Urban schools have better food & sleeping conditions with beds and bedding vs dirt floors with mats
- Urban schools are well exposed to the latest teaching tools, technology and have electricity maintained with generators.
- Urban schools have on site tutoring from both teachers and other students.
- Extracurriculars as well as daily chapel are a blessing!

HOWEVER, BOARDING IS EXPENSIVE:

- Ten times the cost of the local village schools, MCM
 has had to add it gradually. In addition to tuition it is
 also costly to provide mattresses, bedding, jerry cans
 and other supplies necessary to live away from home.
- MCM is also very blessed the boarding schools we partner with give **discounts on tuition** because we are like-minded ministries. Their discount can take off up to 50%! Without it, costs would be prohibitive. We thank our American partners for extra resources to move students into dormitories.



RESULTS:

- We always pray for more resources to board as many of our students as possible because the results have been almost instant in improved academic success and the children's welfare reported to me.
- For our sponsors whose children have moved to boarding, this change is visible when you look at your children's progress reports. It is very satisfying seeing the improvement.

• Some students went from scoring third grades to getting FIRST grades on P.7 exams. It is just short of a miracle! Last year we moved four of the girls who had been struggling in our village school. All four scored FIRST grades in their P. 7 exams! This would not have happened if they had stayed at home in rural schools. (see story on Bonita Ayebare on the next page).

Last year we had 8 students sitting
UAC exams (taken after six years of
secondary school). All but one qualified
for university! These are not easy exams so we are
proud of our children who excelled. Praise God these
Ugandans are going

to transform our community with their diplomas!

ADDITIONAL UPDATES:

We cannot attribute our academic improvement to boarding schools alone. The existence of the MCM God's Joy Library has been phenomenal too! The simple fact that we have a wide variety of books and conducive reading space



available at their disposable, just small distances from students' homes, has also been a huge convenience, help, and resource for them. We hope to keep seeing additions to our library materials causing more improvement in student performances.

The self sustaining farming projects

are going well, especially the banana plantation which gives us monthly income as it keeps expanding. Sorghum and Irish potatoes continue to provide income seasonally.

The Boda (motorcycle) program now supports in excess of 140 primary school children! Our office used to be swamped with people requesting help who are now blessed. If we had more of these machines, we could easily help more children! We pray God enables us to purchase more Bodas to help more families.

God has always been good. MCM keeps moving from glory to glory bringing change all over Uganda. MCM graduates are working in different parts of the country improving those communities too. Please receive our great appreciation for all the ways you have helped this ministry reach the vulnerable here. Without your generosity and kindness, our villagers

would still be in trouble. Slowly, one family at a time, we are seeing transformation.

May God bless all of you enormously.

Christian and I are excited about writing to two MCM students, Ronald and Rooney, brothers who are teens in high school.

We look forward to getting to know them more. In addition, we enjoy spending time with family and friends and our three cats. We also enjoy being outside (especially when it is warm), trying new creative things and traveling. Our wedding is planned for August!

BLESSED BY BOARDING; BONITA'S STORY

When Bonita Ayebare was added to the MCM program in 2013 she was six years old, in Primary One and the oldest of three children. Both her parents were alive but her father was sickly and the family had little land to farm. Bonita was sponsored in February 2014 by Jim and Linda Oddo who have faithfully stood beside both Bonita and another boy, SO supportive and always giving extra.

Since then Bonita has experienced one hardship after another. In 2015 her Mum abandoned her Dad for another man and moved away leaving the three children under 8 years old with their sickly father. In 2016 Bonita's father died. All three children were taken in by their Auntie Ann who already had 3 other children she cared for. Scholastically Bonita ranked in the bottom 20% of her class and had to repeat Primary One and Primary Four.

In 2019 Bonita became the oldest child in Auntie Ann's home as the older children left. This increased her responsibilities for fetching water, washing clothes, gathering wood for fires, cooking, cleaning and watching the younger children. Then Auntie Ann, in her 60's, suffered a stroke and was hospitalized. Ivan took action at that point and MCM hired a neighbor to help take the burden off Bonita who was looking very thin and stressed at age 12.

Then in January 2020, when MCM was blessed with the extra resources required for boarding tuition, both Bonita and her brother were enrolled at Child Africa, a wonderful new school MCM had received tuition discounts from. Unfortunately after only 6 weeks of Primary Six, the COVID pandemic locked down all Ugandan schools and Bonita was sent home for two years to continue running the home.

In 2022 Bonita should have been returned to Primary Six however the Ugandan Ministry of Education required all students to skip to the next class so Bonita entered her hardest, most challenging "Candidate Year", Primary Seven. Candidate students are driven hard all year to prepare for a national exam which ranks them for high school placement. By

the grace of God, with a full year of Child Africa
Teachers helping her, regular daily meals and
good sleep, without time lost on chores, Bonita
scored a FIRST Grade on her exam!! Everyone was
THRILLED for her! Honestly, she was the talk of
the village!

In January of 2023 Bonita began boarding at a top ranked secondary school, Solberg College, where she is studying to be a Nurse. Bonita's goal to be a Nurse has been her heart's desire every single year since she was seven years old. We hope she will someday attain it with the blessing of boarding!



Gift (12) in Primary Four
wants to be a Teacher.
Gift's mother died in
childbirth without revealing
the name of Gift's father
who is still unknown. Gift has
lived with her grandfather
since she was born but he
is elderly and cannot afford
her care or school fees.



BRIGHTON A.
Brighton (17) in Senior
One wants to be a Doctor.
His mother was never known because his father brought him as an infant to his grandma then disappeared.
Brighton's grandma died in January 2022 so he now lives with an Aunt. Brighton has been waiting since June 2022



FAITH A.
Faith (15) in Senior One wants to be a Lawyer.
Her parents are peasant farmers who work for others as they have no land of their own. Their income cannot sustain their family.
Faith has been waiting for a sponsor since May 2022.



KENNEDY T.
Kennedy (14) in Senior
One wants to be a Lawyer.
His mother died in 2014
from a neck tumor. His
father suffered a stroke in
2020 and cannot move or
speak. Kennedy lives with
his grandma a peasant
farmer who can no longer
dig with her back pain.
Kennedy has been waiting
since June 2022.
